**Getting there** 

Sandpoint is about 80 miles northeast of Spokane International Airport, and Schweitzer is 12 miles from town. Take the shuttle (\$3 round-trip) to the resort from the Schweitzer Park & Ride at the base of Schweitzer Mountain Road. INFO schweitzer.com



# SANDPOINT, ID Have Schweitzer Mountain all to yourself

The numbers at Schweitzer speak for themselves: 2,900 skiable acres (that means less than one skier per acre on all but the busiest holiday weekends); 300+ inches of average annual snowfall; three terrain parks; 92 runs, including a 2.4-mile continuous groomer; 20 miles of nordic trails; and the state's only high-speed sixperson lift. Views from the top include three mountain ranges, three states, Canada, and 65-mile-long Lake Pend Oreille. Not only that, lift lines are nearly nonexistent, and a ticket will set you back just \$68. Nonskiers will love the free movies, guided snowshoe hikes (\$15), and on-mountain wine tastings (from \$10) at Gourmandie. schweitzer.com

# The sleeps

Schweitzer Mountain Resort (from \$168; schweitzer.com) has 113 ski-in/ski-out rooms in its base area (for perspective, Vail has more than 600) and a newly redone pool. But just outside town, the 1,100-acre, fourth-generation Western Pleasure Guest Ranch (from \$125; westernpleasureranch.com) has an even more throwback feel. A working cattle ranch, it also has 2 miles of cross-country ski and snowshoe trails. Or you can bundle up in a blanket and let the draft horses do the pulling on a 2-mile antique-sleigh ride through the forest.

## The town

Sandpoint (pop. 7,300) is an ideal complement to Schweitzer's traditional charm, with minimal winter crowds. First Avenue, the four-block main drag, is lined with brick shops and galleries. Locals gather at Evans Brothers Roastery & Neighborhood Espresso Bar (524 Church St.; 208/265-5553) for single-origin drip-to-order coffee; they've heard "Better than Stumptown" more than once. For small plates and sips, La Rosa Club (\$\$; 105 S. First Ave.; 208/255-2100) pours a clean-tasting cucumber cocktail, which contrasts well with the bacony brussels sprouts. For dinner, try the century-old home turned Mediterranean oasis Little Olive (\$\$; 124 S. Second Ave.; 208/ 597-7499). Flaming saganaki, comin' up. >33
